The Annual Report 2003/2004 shows that more and more organisations are joining the European Movement International (EMI), that the EMI has intensified its relationship with its members and that more and more common activities are taking place together.

The European Movement International is by far the largest pro-European organisation with members in 41 countries across Europe.

Nevertheless, the EMI is not yet a lobbying organisation which can claim to be satisfied with its achievements.

Although many of its proposals for the constitutional treaty were taken into account by the Convention and while trans-national projects with members reached several millions of people, the capacity of the EMI and its members to speak with one voice or to be a major pressure group mobilising enough citizens to support a more united, federal Europe is still not satisfactory.

A much-stronger European Movement is necessary because in many EU member states governments, national administrations and citizens seem to have lost their focus on United Europe. Thus, discussions started with all members to define the future challenges of the EMI and to decide which ways and means are required to create pan-European professionalism and increase efficiency in fulfilling future tasks.

Thanks to the strong engagement of the many members of the various committees and working groups, the EMI has been able to produce high-quality policy papers. This increased the credibility of the European Movement as a whole as well as its legitimacy to continue the legacy of its founding fathers of 1948 – to lobby for a united Europe based on the respect of the basic human rights and the principles of a representative and participative democracy and of solidarity in a social market economy.

2 | EMI ACTIVITY REPORT

The activities of the EMI were focused on two main themes.

I. MAKING ITS VOICE HEARD REGARDING THE FUTURE OF EUROPE

A. European Constitution

Activities at the EU level

During 2003 and the first semester of 2004 the EMI increased its activities – informing citizens and decision-makers, launching debates at the national and international level and conveying its message that the adoption of a European Constitution is a fundamental objective.

The EMI followed each phase of the decision-making process through the **direct lobbying of European political leaders** (e.g. at meetings with Convention members). The EMI also lobbied **civil society organisations** at the EU level and frequently participated in hearings for NGOs organised by the **Economic and Social Committee**. Furthermore, the EMI contributed to the discussion through **a number of resolutions, press releases and position papers**. The EMI website was used to transmit the European Movement's position to the general public (See the list of the documents in chapter 3).

Through these actions, the EMI urged the European Convention to present a draft Constitution and called upon heads of state and government to reach a consensus during the IGC and to approve the European Constitution as drafted by the European Convention.

Following the failure of the IGC in December 2003, the EMI, in its resolution of January 27th called for an agreement on the European Constitution before May 1st 2004, the date of enlargement of the EU to 25 countries.

Since this deadline also failed to be met, the EMI tried to increase pressure on the political leaders of the now-enlarged EU by involving European citizens once again and by launching a **Europe-wide petition campaign "GIVE EUROPE A CONSTITUTION!"**, in which it calls upon political leaders to take their responsibility at this historical moment for the future of Europe and to reach a consensus during the June Summit on the Constitution in the spirit of the draft proposed by the European Convention.

The petition, available in almost all EU languages, was sent by the EMI to its national councils in all 25 member states, and to all member organisations, institutions and private persons.

Activities at the National level

The **trans-national project "Our Future Our Europe"** co-ordinated by the European Movement International included a large number of national events focused on the main objective of building European citizens' awareness on the Future of Europe. A **final international conference in Athens** brought high-level personalities and NGO representatives together from all over Europe and was a highly successful (see chapter 4).

B. Enlargement

Activities at the EU level

The EMI **working group on enlargement** continued its work on the various aspects of enlargement and the Federal Council in Chios approved the **resolution** on "South – Eastern Europe and EU enlargement".

On the 1st of May 2004, the EMI organised an **information stand in the European Parliament** on the occasion of enlargement, at which it presented its work to the general public. EMI Publications were distributed, the EMI websites were presented and the DVD "Coming Home To Europe" produced in the framework of the EMI information campaign on enlargement was shown throughout the day.

In autumn 2004, the EMI will **welcome members of the EP and new commissioners** from the new member states of the EU to a specially-organised reception.

Activities at the National level

In 2003, the EMI's **information campaign on enlargement**, "Enlarge your knowledge" was launched. It aims at raising public awareness and support for enlargement of the European Union among citizens and civil society organisations in the member states of the EU (see also chapter 4). The project continues into 2004. The campaign – supported by the European Commission – includes over 100 events organised by 16 partners in 11 countries, such as radio and TV programmes, rallies, public events, debates, training sessions and cultural events. A final publication will be produced in autumn 2004.

C. Mediterranean Dialogue

Activities at the EU level

The rapidly evolving situation in the Mediterranean region is of major importance to the EU. The EMI Federal Council meeting in Chios (7/6/2003), unanimously approved the **establishment of a Mediterranean committee**. The Federal Council in Rome (6/12/2003) approved a resolution which stated its objective to study a range of measures for closer political and economic relations with neighbouring countries in the Mediterranean area, as well as its determination to foster relations with Mediterranean partners, notably through a Congress, equivalent to the one held in The Hague in 1948. The Steering Committee, gathered in Brussels (27/4/2004) decided to organise the **Congress in two stages**. A first meeting will take place at the end of 2004. The second one will be held the following year, possibly in a southern-neighbouring country, coinciding with the tenth anniversary of the Euro-Mediterranean Partnership. The meeting in 2004 will prepare the agenda and the list of participants to be invited to the Congress in 2005.

II. INCREASING COOPERATION WITH NATIONAL COUNCILS AND MEMBER ORGANISATIONS

The President and the Secretary-General have increased their presence at activities at the national level and relations with international members. The aim is to **strengthen solidarity between members**.

Visits took place to Austria, Belarus, France, Georgia, Germany, Italy, Kaliningrad, Latvia, Moldova, the Netherlands, Poland, Portugal, Romania, and the Ukraine.

The European Movement has to become an even stronger pro-European NGO promoting the aims, challenges and benefits of the European Union, which should ultimately become a federal Union.



In 2003/2004, **the following councils joined the EMI**: Belarus, Iceland and Moldova.

The Executive Committee proposed to the Federal Council in June 2004 to accept the region of Kaliningrad as a preparatory committee of Russia, Region of Kaliningrad as a first initiative towards a Russian National Council.

EMI internal meetings

1. Federal Council

The Federal Council met twice in 2003.

The first meeting was held in Greece on the 6, 7 and 8 of June and the second meeting in Rome on the 6 and 7 of December. The main items on the agenda were the Convention, the future of the Union, Enlargement and Mediterranean Dialogue.

2. Steering Committee

The Steering Committee ensures the political follow-up of the organisation. It met 6 times. Major position papers and press statements focused on all the major policies of the EMI and were prepared by its relevant working groups:

- *Future of Europe*
- *Constitutional Affairs*
- *Mediterranean Dialogue*
- *Enlargement*

3. Secretaries-General

The Secretaries-General of the National Councils and Member Organisations met four times. During these meetings, a programme of action based on the priorities set by the European Commission was elaborated and the decisions of the Federal Council were executed.

- *Think Tank of the European Movement (TTEM)*
- *Traineeship Programme*

EMI Website

In order to **increase its ever-growing audience** and to spread its message even further, the EMI has continued to update its website with the aim of becoming a major reference point on European affairs.

Through the website, the EMI promotes integration and the enlargement process as well as the democratisation of the European Union (more details under chapter 5).

9TH OF MAY 2004

Europe-wide celebration of Europe Day

Building on the success of the past two years, the EMI coordinated the Europe Day project in 2004 and succeeded in extending the number of participating countries this year. A broad spectrum of events was organised to celebrate Europe Day for the first time in the enlarged European Union. Additional focus was also given to the European Parliament elections of June 2004.

Project in brief:

- ❖ **In 26 European countries** in co-operation with the National Councils of the EMI
- ❖ **More than 200 activities** including radio and TV programmes, debates, readings, information stands, simulation games, essay and painting competitions, photo competitions, concerts and exhibitions
- ❖ **Annual Award** for a "Contribution of the Year" was organised by each partner
- ❖ **Over 15 million people were reached** through extensive media coverage
- ❖ **A final publication** will be produced in autumn 2004

9TH OF MAY 2003

Europe-wide celebration of Europe Day

The 9th of May project, aimed at celebrating Europe Day through educational, cultural, artistic activities and political highlights was extended in 2003 to additional countries.

Project in brief:

- ❖ **18 European countries** in co-operation with the national councils of the EMI
- ❖ **More than 120 activities** including radio and TV programmes, debates, lectures, information stands, simulation games, essay and painting competitions, photo competitions, concerts and exhibitions
- ❖ **Annual Award** for a "Contribution of the Year" to an individual or an organisation for their work towards the advancement of the integration process. In 2003, 12 prizes were awarded to such personalities as Anders Fogh Rasmussen (Danish Prime Minister), Romano Prodi (President of the European Commission) and Marija Naumova (winner of the 2002 European Song Contest)
- ❖ **Over 7 million people were reached** through extensive media coverage
- ❖ **Final brochure**, "Festival of Europe 2003" has been produced and distributed to the national councils of the EMI, its member organisations, the European Parliament, the European Commission and all other institutions in Brussels

"ENLARGE YOUR KNOWLEDGE" Europe-wide information campaign on enlargement

In October 2003, the European Movement launched a Europe-wide information and consultation campaign on enlargement aimed at raising public awareness and support for enlargement of the European Union among citizens and civil society organisations in the member states of the EU.

The activities organised in the framework of the project, (e.g. the "Enlargement Rally" in Brussels, which opened over 70 places of interest to the general public, all connected to one or more of the ten new member states of the EU) were considered **highly successful** and attracted a large number of participants.

Project in brief:

- ❖ **15 project partners in 11 countries** from Ireland to Greece
- ❖ **More than 100 activities** including radio and TV programmes, debates & lectures, concerts, outdoor events, competitions and film evenings etc.

"OUR FUTURE – OUR EUROPE" – BUILDING EUROPEAN AWARENESS

Trans-national information and debate campaign on the future shape of the EU

A supra-national information and consultation campaign aimed at involving as many citizens as possible in the debate on the future development of the EU was carried out by the EMI in co-operation with its national councils. The results of the campaign and media attention proved that the campaign was a highly successful experience and made an admirable contribution to bridging the gap between citizens and organised groups at local, national and EU levels.

Project in brief:

- ❖ **21 countries involved** from Finland to Cyprus
- ❖ **Three thematic frameworks** (the changes brought about by enlargement/the role of EU institutions, how to bring citizens closer to decision-makers and what it means to be "European") and a questionnaire were the basis for consultations with citizens
- ❖ **More than 120 activities** including radio and TV programmes, panel debates & lectures, opinion polls, web-pages, training sessions and film presentations etc.
- ❖ Examples of the **campaign's results:**

Positive signs of European Awareness: the EURO, youth exchange programmes, the 12-star flag and the 9th of May were recognised as positive symbols of the EU

People expressed a lack of information and consultation of civil societies regarding decision-making at the European level – representatives of civil society have asked to be consulted more

The EU needs a constitution – a clear majority believed that the outcome of the Convention should be established in the form of a Constitution

- ❖ **A final conference** took place in Athens on the 20th and 21st of February 2003 with the participation of Valéry Giscard d'Estaing, President of the Convention and gathered over 500 participants e.g. members of the Convention, decision-makers and representatives of civil society from 25 countries
- ❖ **Millions of people were reached** through extensive media coverage at the national and international level
- ❖ **Final brochure** "Our future – Our Europe. Building European awareness 2002 –2003" was produced and distributed to the national councils of the EMI, its member organisations, the European Parliament, the European Commission and all institutions in Brussels

5 | THE EMI WEBSITES

An interactive method of involving European citizens and connecting the EMI network

During the past year, the **EMI website has been restyled** in order to be a more attractive and useful information and communication tool for the general public and also to become more suitable for the EMI's own network of national councils and member organisations.

The website has progressively become **an interactive reference tool** for the implementation of trans-national projects.

As a result, the **number of visitors has continually increased**. In May 2004, it reached a number of 53 200 monthly page views and 8 121 visitor sessions. The average visitor spends approximately 14 minutes online.

The following **information** can be found on the EMI website:

- ❖ History, mission and key themes of the EMI
- ❖ Structure of the EMI, including the geographical division of national councils and member organisations
- ❖ Current staff of the EMI
- ❖ Contacts addresses (phone, fax, mail, website and contact person) of each EMI national council and member organisation
- ❖ List of activities organised by the EMI and its national councils at the local and international level
- ❖ List of documents produced by the EMI (resolutions, press releases etc.) divided by working subject
- ❖ Recent news

The EMI website also offers the general public the possibility to **subscribe to the EMI newsletter**, to request material produced by the EMI (brochures, DVDs, CDs) and to participate in electronic campaigns launched by the EMI.

The website contains a restricted "**Members Area**", that is only accessible to registered members of the EMI through their personal accounts. Members have the following options:

- ❖ To read internal documents related to internal meetings of the EMI (agenda and minutes of meetings, guidelines for projects, etc.)
- ❖ To insert events organised at the national level in the "Calendar of Events" on the website
- ❖ To actively participate in the work of the EMI working groups for which they have registered
- ❖ To have access to the chat area for online working meetings

In November 2003 **a new website linked to the main website** was launched. It was dedicated to the "Enlarge your Knowledge" project – the trans-national information campaign on EU enlargement coordinated by the EMI in 11 EU Member States.

This website provides **background information on the enlargement process** and a detailed calendar of activities organised in the framework of the project. Furthermore, information on the project partners and sponsors is available on the website. Some interactive tools such as opinion polls, quizzes to test one's knowledge on the new member states and enlargement in general as well as a section where visitors can ask a question to the individual national councils are to be found on the website.

Additionally a series of **ten original video-clips** on the new member states of the EU can be downloaded from the website or copies may be requested directly from the EMI Secretariat.

Further developments of the two websites are expected in the future. The public area will be enhanced through the addition of more interactive tools and extra audio-video material available for downloading. The members' area will be improved by offering a richer range of documents for viewing and a better use of the working groups section.
